#### 1. Call to order

# 2. Public comments

Superintendent/President Serban noted that if anyone in the community had any questions regarding the bond, they should contact either her or Vice President Sullivan. They would be happy to answer any questions.

Mr. Trembly reported that he has been asked why during these difficult budget times we are looking at building more structures on campus when the money is needed for other expenses. He explains to them that this is what the money was voted for and the funds cannot be used for operational expenses.

Mr. O'Neill thanked the committee members for taking time to participate on the Bond Oversight Committee.

## 3. Approval of the minutes of the November 6, 2008 meeting

Upon motion by Mr. Trembly, seconded by Ms. Tafoya, the Committee approved the minutes of the meeting of November 6, 2008. Mr. Rose abstained.

## 4. Update on the sale of the bonds

Superintendent/President Serban reported that the sell of the bonds was a success; the first issuance of the bond was oversubscribed. The money has been placed in our account with the County of Santa Barbara and it was decided that it would earn a better interest rate there than trying to invest it in other interest earning venues. In item 10 of this agenda a report will be presented to show how the \$47 million has been tentatively allocated among the various projects, based on estimated costs.

RBC and Estrada Hinojosa were our bond underwriters, RBC for 75% and Estrada Hinojosa for 25%. RBC staff has been great to work with, Ryan Vollmer helped us prepare our materials for the credit rating and we are very happy with the outcome.

- 5. Project management for bond funded projects
  - a. Introduction of Steve Massetti, Project Manager, URS
  - b. Review of responsibilities of URS project management team

Vice President Sullivan introduced Steve Massetti, Project Manager, and highlighted the role and responsibilities of URS on the construction projects.

Mr. Steve Massetti reported that URS' role is to manage the overall bond construction program; the list provided as an attachment gave a complete overview of their roles and responsibilities. A consolidated explanation of their scope of work was provided.

- Overall role is to manage the bond construction program.
- Develop and maintain both the Master Program Budget and the Master Program Schedule.
- Monitor and handle all of the paperwork required on all of the projects.
- Implement Contract Manager (the software used to track all projects, timelines, status and expenditures) with access given to Superintendent/President Serban, Vice President Sullivan and Facilities Director Hendricks.

# 6. Status of state matching funds for capital outlay projects

Superintendent/President Serban reported that on December 17 the College was informed that the current Pooled Money Investment Board voted to freeze all disbursements for State capital projects. In our case, the immediate impact is the matching funds for the Drama/Music remodel. The reason this decision was made was because the State tried to sell bonds and they were only able to sell about 1/3 of them. In better fiscal years there is no problem in selling these bonds and there is no problem in replenishing the funds required for construction projects approved. This year the State was not able to replenish the funds at a level needed for approved projects. However, colleges have been advised that they are free to go ahead with work that is needed and pay for it from district funds and in doing so they would not be relinquishing the right for reimbursement at a later date, once the State is able to sell their bonds. Internally with our shared governance groups and the Board of Trustees, discussions have taken place on whether or not we should go forward and take \$12 million from Measure V and proceed with the Drama/Music remodel with the understanding that we will not be relinquishing the right to obtain State reimbursement. The decision was made to go ahead with the remodel.

The issue would be School of Media Arts (SoMA) because if there are no state matching funds available when this project is ready to begin the College will not be able to begin construction. We cannot proceed with SoMA without state matching funds.

# 7. Status of the drama music remodel project

Mr. Steve Massetti reviewed the three scenarios that were developed for the Drama/Music remodel. Currently the job is out to bid, anticipated Board approval will be in March, the anticipated construction start will be mid March or beginning of April, and then there will be 13 months of construction, which will put the completion date at the end of May 2010. Up until the April 30 date and if nothing major happens, all of the scenario dates are achievable. The best case scenario has a 13 month construction schedule that is aggressive; it does not take into account any unforeseen conditions. The more likely scenario has a 15 month construction schedule and the worst case scenario has a 17 month construction schedule. The plan would be to complete the theater space and allow staff to move that area back in and then the classrooms and offices would be completed and staff would be allowed to move back in after the punch list is approved.

This project is not a typical project where one contractor is selected to build everything; there are three separate packages: the general building package, the theater specialty package and the audio visual specialty package, which means that the College may end up with three separate contractors or just one contractor building all three.

The question was asked whether the College had to accept the low-bid and Mr. Massetti explained that the College had to accept the lowest responsive and responsible bidder.

# 8. Preliminary schedule of bond funded maintenance projects

Superintendent/President Serban explained that this schedule is an accumulation of projects over many years. It has been through our internal governance shared process. Due to the lack of resources, many of these projects have been on the schedule for a long time, now with the resources through Measure V some of the projects will be funded. The priority numbers were assigned internally by our end-users and various departments and then Joe Sullivan, Steve Massetti and others came up with the priority system listed on the attachment as there are only so many projects that can be completed. Some projects are underway such as the Luria Conference and Press Center, which will largely be funded with private donations received along with a \$500,000 donation from the Luria Foundation, it was noted that the current press box is old and the new building will actually be a press box and conference center which will allow for other venues to use the area. Due to safety issues, the bridge deck will also be repaired. One problem with the college environment is that many of these projects need to take place during breaks, which limits the window of opportunity.

Superintendent/President Serban provided an overview of the SBCC Measure V website. Listed below is the information that can be found on the website:

- The Bond Oversight Committee and its members.
- Meeting dates, agendas and minutes.

- News or press releases regarding the bond.
- Updates regarding the bond.

Anyone who has questions regarding the bond should be directed to the website. There they will be able to find all the information available related to the bond, such as the initial ballot and all of the information that was given to the committee in their binders. The expenditure reports will also be posted on the site. If the committee members have anything they want added to the website they should speak with Superintendent/President Serban. # 10. Expenditure report

Vice President Sullivan reported that this report provided information on expenditures. The first page provided the revenue amount received from the bonds and interest from the bond construction fund. The other pages reflect the projects and amounts that will be used from the bond construction fund. Superintendent/President Serban noted that even though the total for the bond construction fund is \$47,962,633 there are adjustments that still need to be made, such as the private donations received for the Luria Conference and Press Center and also the alternative funding that will be used for the photovoltaic system. It was also noted that the estimates are rough estimates and the final costs are not known. It was noted that the due to the current financial situation it could be possible for these figures to be lower.

# 11. Adjournment

Committee President Heron adjourned the meeting and the next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, June 18, 2009.

# Project Status:

## #6567 School of Media Arts:

- Additional design work related to the fire system water supply is underway.
- Plans and specifications picked up by O'Connor Construction Management, Inc. (OCMI) to begin the constructability review process.
- The completed set submitted to the Division of the State Architect (DSA) will be sent to OCMI to prepare a cost estimate.
- The State reduced the funding by \$8.15M.
- The College received approval from the Chancellor's Office, authorizing the College to commence development of working drawings consistent with the revised preliminary plans.
- It is anticipated that the project will be submitted to DSA by the end of July 2009.

#### #6582 Drama/Music Modernization:

- Authorization to award bids was received from the Chancellor's Office on May 22, 2009.
- Due to delays in approval, original schedule analysis is no longer accurate.
- Limited Notice to Proceed (NTP) issued effective June 1, 2009. Preconstruction Meeting held June 4, 2009.
- Mobilization underway.
- Construction Commencement: June 15, 2009. Anticipated Completion: Summer 2010.

#### #6586 Luria Conference and Press Center:

- Abatement, demolition, overexcavation and recompaction are complete.
- Underground plumbing, electrical, footing excavation and concrete formwork underway.
- Upcoming work includes reinforcing steel and concrete placement.
- Project signage has been installed.
- Construction Commencement: April 2009. Anticipated Completion: December 2009.

#### #6587 Bridge Deck Repair/Replacement:

- Construction anticipated during Summer 2009. Bids opened April 7, 2009.
- Program Management Team (PMT) is coordinating with College Administration regarding issues anticipated due to bridge closure.
- Coordination issues anticipated with City due to work over roadway.
- Low bidder was Cushman Contracting. Potential issue with proposed deck surface.
- PMT has conferred with the Architect (Behr Browers) regarding the use of an alternate deck material, known as Tufflex. Cushman responded. Architect stated he was unwilling to recommend the substitution.
- NTP issued effective June 15, 2009 and preconstruction meeting held June 11, 2009.
- College will procure deck coating material (Siplast).
- Construction Commencement: June 2009. Anticipated Completion: August 2009.

#### #6611 Keyless Entry (Electronic Locks):

- PMT met with internal staff to discuss delivery and installation schedule and plan. The IT
  Department will install the electronic hardware and coordinate software programming, etc.
- First application has been installed and is being tested in the IT Department.

# #6637 Children's Center - Misc. Repairs and Upgrades:

- Additional work is required for Child Care Center accreditation.
- Awaiting revision of cost proposal for architectural services, scope development in process.

- This could severely impact traffic circulation and may exceed the budget, even without the needed modifications to the adult and children's restrooms.

#### #6644 Pershing Park - Softball Facility Upgrade:
